The origin of the project *Objet dansant à définir* n° ... comes from the desire to be able to present a dance from which the body-material is missing. I wanted to make visible the "dancing" idea that a contemplation/hypnosis time would lead to an imaginary reasoning and/or a reflection on absence. also the desire to bring together my principal activities (movement, costume, sound) into one project.

The image of the wind in the curtains during the siesta, the idea of everyone's fantasies, Paul Virilio's "Esthétique de la disparition", (maybe some mobiles from my childhood) have been with me and still are with me today on this play.

Objet dansant à définir n°... is a project relying on the fragility and the simplicity of the proposition. Then, it seems important to me to recontexctualise "object" every other performance. Thus, 'hanging/time/progress/material" are modified according to the architectural place.

Three Artistic Journeys

« Last week saw two highly anticipated and long overdue events: the New York debut of the French artist and choreographer Christian Rizzo and the public opening of the newly completed Center for Performance Research in Williamsburg, Brooklyn. Luckily for dance lovers, the two coincided — and proved worth the wait.

Mr. Rizzo's three-part work was presented at the center in association with the French Institute Alliance Française's Crossing the Line festival, which is dedicated to re-examining categories. Fittingly, Mr. Rizzo's project consisted of performance, film and installation: the methods and means changed, but the sensibility and effect remained wonderfully intact from one room to the next.

The experience began with "100% Polyester," an installation by Mr. Rizzo and Caty Olive that centers on two sheer, embroidered dresses and, at the Williamsburg center, could be viewed only from the street, through the glass wall of a small front studio. Hanging from a delicate wire apparatus and joined at the sleeves, the white shifts were illuminated by several floor lights and tossed about by a cluster of fans so that they danced, quietly.

Their shadows played on the white walls and, depending on the changing brightness of the lighting, on the buildings across the street. There was no sleight of hand: you saw all the simple tricks. As the title, "100% Polyester," underlines, everything in the installation is manufactured. What is more mundane, more artificial, than a polyester dress?

And yet. The effect of these ghostly performers was utterly magical and somehow intimate. The bustle of the street receded, replaced by a far more immediate reality. Viewers became like voyeurs, catching a glimpse of a private encounter... »

"Christian Rizzo is a dabbler with multiple resources, a polyvalent artist, non exclusive, who refuses any specialisation: rocker during a while, fashion designer, contemporary art lover, dancer, actor, composer, choreographer. A man of frivolity and thought, a man of daily life and artistic creation all together. ³I am a simple man. I don¹t like complications. Time is music² : these sentences mixed by DJ Food punctuate 100% polyester, like personal winks. A line hangs between the back and the proscenium where two dresses hang from a moving metallic structure, their long sleeves sewn together. Two raw dresses, see-through, inlaid with interlaced artificial hair which recalls vegetal fibres. Fans start one after the other while the mobile goes slowly along the line. The dresses begin to have a floating movement, almost imperceptible, then move lightly, until they lift up and turn round on themselves. Between light and shadow -subtly organised by Cathy Olive elegance, delicacy, a device with an hypnotic effect."
